

Background

On 3 October 2001 the National Security Agency/Central Security Service (NSA/CSS) was designated as the Responsible Training Authority (RTA) for Intermediate and Advanced Cryptologic Language Training. This authority is exercised through the Associate Director for Education and Training (ADET) and delegated to the Language Department of the National Cryptologic School (E3, NCS).

It is the role of an RTA to manage and provide *interservice training* to Military Cryptologists in a particular discipline in accordance with NSA/CSS Circular 40-1. The Military Cryptologic Continuing Education Program (MCCEP) is designed to provide continuing educational opportunities to the Military Cryptologic Language Analyst following graduation from the Apprentice Cryptologic Linguist Specialist Course at Goodfellow AFB and throughout their military career.

The NCS delivers this training utilizing a combination of platform instruction, Computer Based Training and Web Based Training (CBT/WBT).

Curricula

Based on the individual Military Cryptologic Language Analyst's most recent scores on the Defense Language Aptitude Test (DLPT), training is offered at three levels of proficiency. Those below the minimum L2/R2 proficiency level required by DOD Directive will be enrolled in the Remedial Curriculum for their particular foreign language. Personnel who meet the minimum standard but score below the L3/R3 level will be enrolled in the Intermediate Curriculum while those who have achieved the L3/R3 level will be enrolled in the appropriate Advanced Curriculum.

The preferred method of instruction is in the classroom, interacting with a native speaker of the language being studied. However, due to the very nature of military duties and assignments classroom instruction is not always feasible. For personnel who cannot attend classroom instruction, MCCEP brings the classroom to them. At an isolated site, on Independent Duty or on a remote assignment MCCEP has language training available for every Military Cryptologic Language Analyst, everywhere.

Participation

Your parent Service, Reserve or National Guard unit will arrange for your enrollment in MCCEP at the appropriate level within the Agency's Professional Health Program (PHP). Once you are enrolled, your language proficiency and progress will be recorded and updated in a database maintained at the NCS. This database will enable the NCS to keep a finger on the pulse of Military Cryptologic Language Analyst training needs and deliver effective, mission-relevant training in the most cost-effective manner.

Your interaction with MCCEP will usually be through your Command MCCEP Manager and/or your Command Language Program Manager (CLPM). If your parent Service has its own mission-related training program the completion of those modules will be recorded in the MCCEP database and you will receive appropriate credit.

In order for the NCS to evaluate and improve the quality of training provided through MCCEP you will be asked to provide your evaluation and comments on training you receive.
