

Hospital lab manager recognized by military Chess tournament for elementary kids

Mike LaGiglia, laboratory medical technologist at Mountain View Hospital, retired from the Utah Air National Guard on Nov. 25, 2010 after roughly 40 years serving the United States and three stints in war.

LaGiglia most recently served in Afghanistan; he also spent time in Iraq. While LaGiglia was away on active duty, his manager at Mountain View Hospital, Steve Hancock did his best to help LaGiglia serve our country - including keeping his job safe. Hancock would check in on LaGiglia's wife from time to time to see if she was doing okay, and he went out of his way to see that LaGiglia could serve without worry.

"It was monumental for Steve to do what he did, LaGiglia said. "It meant so much to me that he would do things like that."

LaGiglia nominated Hancock and Mountain View Hospital for the Patriot

Award given by the Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve (ESGR). This award recognizes employers who go above and beyond the legal requirements for granting leave to and supporting employees who are serving as military personnel.

"I've been a part of a workforce that wasn't fully supportive of military personnel on active duty," says LaGiglia. "Then I came to Mountain View Hospital and it was completely different. I appreciate the support the hospital has given me."

Above and beyond the legal requirements is exactly what Hancock and his staff did. On several occasions, LaGiglia's co-workers would cover a shift here or a shift there for him. They would also send care packages to him. This was something that touched him deeply.

Hancock knew that LaGiglia's job was worth saving for him while he was deployed. Hancock felt a connection with LaGiglia from the day they first met. It's easy when you have both

"I was in the National Guard and knew when I hired him that it would be hard while he was gone," Hancock recalls. "I knew that Mike was a special person and needed to keep him on my staff."
